Which WS chapter are you in: Northumbria & Durham

A worthy RE:ACTion

In mid-January, a fellow WS of Pilgrims Chapter (Devonshire Province) posted an article on Facebook from a charity called **RE:ACT**, asking for ex-military people to step up and volunteer for a specific task.

RE:ACT is a humanitarian charity that provides direct action in emergencies and crisis, serving the most vulnerable people in need by deploying highly trained **RE:ACT** Response Teams.

I took up the challenge and signed up as a volunteer.

The task was to provide Marshalls to meet, greet and safely manage people arriving and leaving the mass vaccination centre, which was being set up at the Royal Bath and West Showground, Shepton Mallet, Somerset. Three shifts were being set up from 0800-2000.

After completing an on-line training session, and negotiating the NHS competency matrix, I was approved as a Volunteer.

My first shift was 1600-2000 on Tuesday 26 January. I arrived at 1530 and received a brief from the team leader and then 'hung around' waiting for customers. It turned out to be a very quiet shift, so I was invited to have a jab. "Queue jumping" I hear you say, however, the NHS classed the Volunteers as 'key workers' in support of the vaccination role out.

I then completed 7 x 4hr shifts over the next 8 days assisting, on average, 500 people each day. I was booked in for the 1200-1600 shift each day and each shift was different, from the number of customers to the weather. I quite forgot what it was like to stand around in a car park for 4hrs in the cold and wet.


Customers were absolutely fantastic and very complementary to the Volunteers. "I wouldn't like your job" one man said (as if the 'volunteers' were being paid). The standard of driving was a cause for concern though. On more than one

occasion I thought I would be going home in an ambulance after a near miss. One customer hadn't been out of the house for 12 months and found his 'day out' a bit emotional.

The whole experience was very satisfying and therapeutic. It got me off the sofa, out of the house and moving around and I'm pretty sure I got my 10,000 steps each day. Just meeting people and enjoying the banter, swapping 'war stories', friendship, camaraderie and mutual support was exceptional and brought back many happy memories of serving and most essentially, got me out of the house.

Here's hoping that the Volunteers won't be needed much longer, for this particular emergency, however, I hope to do more training with **RE:ACT** to support future emergencies and fly the flag for the Widows Sons along the way.

Southern Chapter – The Big Ride – The Inoculation

Between the 19th and 22nd August 2021, the Southern Chapter are attempting an 1800 motorbike ride in aid of THE HAMPSHIRE & ISLE OF WIGHT AIR AMBULANCE.

Leaving from Chandlers Ford with 21 riders including Michael Wilks PPGM of Hampshire Province and being sent off by the new Provincial Grand Master Jonathan Whittaker. We will be riding up to Membury Services where we will be met by Stone Cutters and Shires Chapters who will be joining us for the whole ride that is another 10 riders and escorted through to Wales by Wyvern Chapter. They will be stopping at Runcorn on the first night.

Leaving early on the Friday Morning riding over to Newcastle to the Angel of the North where we are meeting Northumberland Chapter (a great photo opportunity). Then we will be escorted up to Edinburgh where we will be met by our Scottish Brethren and then further up to Elgin, where we will stop for the second night.

On the Saturday Morning it will be the longest day riding from Elgin up to John O'Groats, and then back down to Kirkbride for our final night. Sunday Morning it is all downhill and back to Chandlers Ford.

The 2021 ride will be the third ride organised by the Chapter. The first year they completed an Iron Butt Challenge, 1000 miles in 22 hours and raising £8,000 for the Hampshire & Isle of Wight Air Ambulance. Year two was a more leisurely ride 1800 miles in three days and again in aid of the Air Ambulance, raising £10,000 and supported handsomely by East Midlands for Breakfast (very welcome after the first part of the ride in the torrential rain) also our Scottish brethren for their great hospitality, escorting us up to John O'Groats, organising a piper to send us off and back to the south.







I am pleased to say that except for Broke-it and Topsy we had an un-eventful trip. Broke-it ended up with no front calliper fixed by Brother Mark (Scotland), a piece of fence wire, cable ties and a lot of ingenuity. Brother Topsy had issues with his battery, but that was quickly sorted, and he got home safely.

This year we are privileged to be joined by the Shires and the Stonecutters Chapters for the whole ride, they will be raising monies for their own charities, and as a combined



contribution we are aiming to double our first two years donations giving us a total of £40,000 in the three years with the 2021 target of £20,000 This year's ride we are luckily to be joined by Wyvern, Northumberland, Scotland East, Scotland West, Scotland North and Midlands Chapters on the run so far with the Southern meeting us on the Sunday to escort the ride back home.

The age of the riders ranges from 28 to 80 and the bikes range from 3 years old to 20 years old, including Yamaha XJR 1300, BMWs, Triumph Tiger, M7, 2 Honda Gold-wings and 2 pan Europeans 1300 one with over 106,000 miles on the clock. The riders will be in the saddle for 10 - 12 hours a day and have spent a total of £1400 on accommodation and will use 1050 gallons of fuel or £1260.00 total.

Meanwhile, we finally got around to designing a new chapter patch/logo which we officially adopted in November 2020.


Having found our Facebook page to be an excellent promotional tool (now with over 1800 followers) we decided to expand our online presence by updating our website and creating an Instagram account.





Apparently, the Benevolent Fund struggles to attract donations as there is a misconception that the MOD provide the required cash. It was therefore great to help them with their cause, and the Widows Sons look forward to joining them on some of their future events.

Brian 'George' Dent & Nicola Norville provided the five members of the Widows Sons with a guided tour of the Centre and explained that they are employed full time at the DMRC and work on a voluntary basis for the Benevolent Fund in their spare time.




A new dawn in Portugal

The secretary, Alexandre Cebrian Valente, and the VP, Jose Santos, of Moto Maco (Portuguese Motorcycling Masons), have joined the South





Freemasonry in Gibraltar

Freemasonry was first established in Gibraltar possibly as early as 1726 when a number of military Brethren congregated to form the first Masonic Lodge in the Garrison. The earliest recorded evidence of their Masonic activities can be traced to the Grand Lodge Minutes for the 10th May 1727 which records:

'His Grace the Duke of Richmond proposed health and success to our brethren of the lodge of Gibraltar, which was drank accordingly.' This Lodge became known as the Lodge of St. John of Jerusalem No.51 became the first known lodge to have worked outside the British Isles.



In 1732, Captain James Cummerford became the first Provincial Grand Master and in 1752 Colonel J.G Montresor, himself a founder member of the Lodge of St. John of Jerusalem No. 51 was appointed Provincial Grand Master in 1752 with a patent which included a provision for the establishment of a Provincial Grand Lodge in Gibraltar. Montresor left Gibraltar a few years later and for a number of years the office remained vacant, however, in 1761 Lieutenant General Edward Cornwallis arrived as Governor assuming the office of Provincial Grand Master. A second Governor would also serve as Provincial Grand Master - HRH the Duke of Kent. He would hold the distinction of holding the Office of Provincial Grand Master for Gibraltar as well as Grand Master of the Antients until the amalgamation of the two Grand Lodges in 1813.

After the Great Siege, Gibraltar's military presence naturally began to recede but its strategic importance as a naval base of

operations in the Mediterranean became evident. In 1789, Calpean Lodge with ties to the Royal Navy was founded. A number of its members would later serve with Nelson's fleet, including at Trafalgar. Friendship Lodge, founded in 1791, included a motley crew of privateers, merchants, Portuguese marines and Naval Officers and even French Royalists opposed to Napoleon. A fascinating aspect of this Lodge being that they were all Catholics in a staunchly Protestant military Garrison.

Following the amalgamation of the two Grand Lodges in England, the new policies of the United Grand Lodge of England regarding traveling lodges and the demands of the new British military hierarchy forced many military lodges to return their charters.

Naturally, the large number of military personnel stationed in the colony and the new resurgence of interest in Freemasonry necessitated the founding of new permanent English, Irish and Scottish Lodges in Gibraltar to accommodate large numbers of civilian as well as military Freemasons. During the 19th Century a number of new Lodges were founded.

In 1876, the District Grand Lodge of Scotland was founded with Bro. Thomas Haynes elected as its first District Grand Master.

The construction of the Naval Dockyard towards the end of the century brought a substantial number of Military personnel back to the Rock. Between 1901 and the end of WWI a number of Lodges with a distinct military character were founded. After WWII, the military presence in Gibraltar declined gradually with many of the hitherto military Lodges incorporating locals to replace military personnel who had left. Despite this decline, a few new Lodges were founded towards the end of the 20th Century.

Today, Gibraltar remains a hub of vibrant Masonic activity with Lodges working under the three Constitutions as well as a number of Chapters, Mark Lodges and other side degrees all meeting at the Gibraltar Masonic Institute, 47A Prince Edward's Road


